Let's Get Them Reading

Without a doubt, reading is the most important skill children must develop. If they can't read, they can't succeed. So, how do we get kids, specifically boys, to read more and to make reading a life-long habit?

Jon Scieszka, author of <u>The True Story of the 3 Little Pigs</u> and <u>The Stinky Cheese Man and other Fairly Stupid Tales</u>, is also the founder of **Guys Read**, a web-based literacy program for boys. Scieszka maintains that we can motivate boys to read by connecting them with materials they will want to read. Here are a few of his suggestions:

- Expand our definition of reading to include more non-fiction, humour, graphic novels, and audio books
- Give boys choice by finding out what they want and letting them choose from a newer, wider range of reading materials
- Encourage more men to be role models in reading
- Start small because we can't change habits overnight.
